The men were kept in small parties and one detachment came upon a band of Indians and had a brush. Two Indians were killed, but, as usual, those that escaped managed to carry off the guns of the slain. Flynn and his guide, while out alone, also had the good fortune to have an Indian spy run upon them when they were in ambush. They "bagged" him.

Capt. Flynn thinks that most of the Indians are now fishing, and that it is likely many of the hostile Mad Rivers are on Trinity. He thinks he is now sufficiently acquainted with the country to be his own guide. He has had much more experience in the section of country where the Indians have been most hostile than any other officer in this district, and if we are not badly mistaken in the man he will deal with Indians when he finds them according to the system of Indian fighting which we in this county think is right. Give Flynn a chance.
