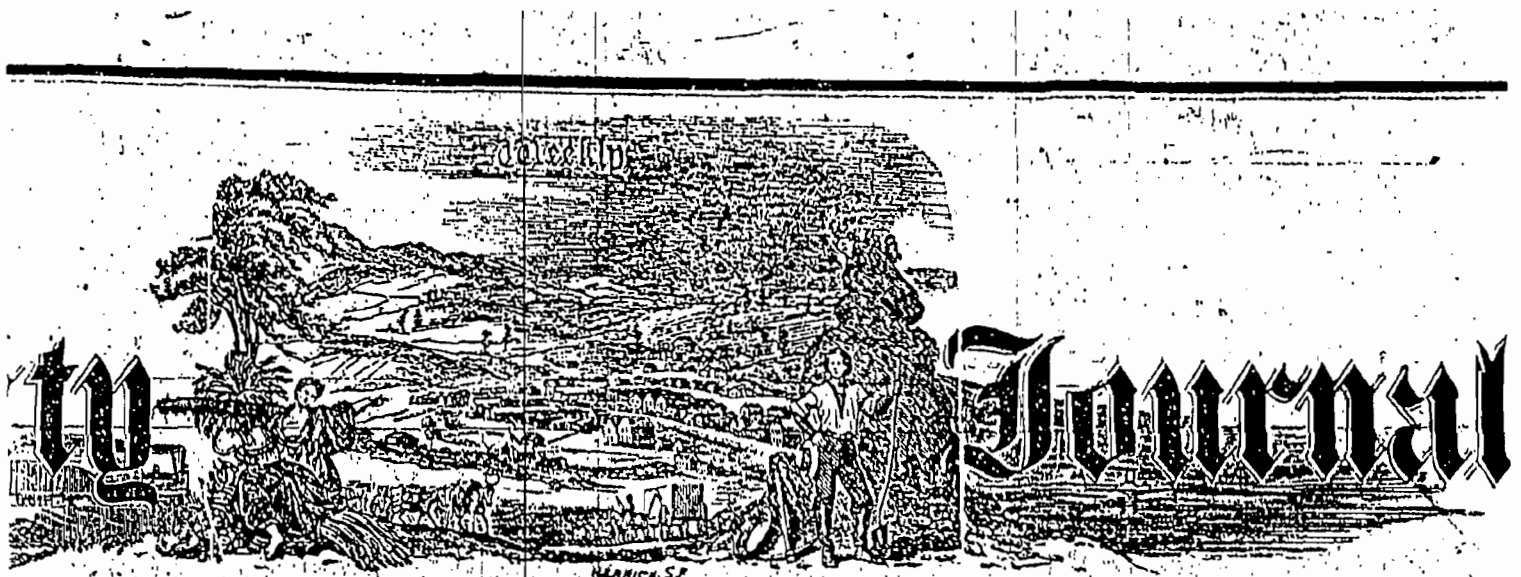


**TROOPS FOR HUMBOLDT.**—A dispatch to the Sacramento Bee, dated San Francisco, Jan. 3d, states that a correspondence between Gen. Wright and Indian Superintendent Hanson, shows that a formidable movement against the belligerent Indians of Humboldt, Trinity, Klamath and Del Norte, is about being made by Federal troops, with the intention of removing the Indians to Reservations. A new military district has been established, the headquarters of which will be Fort Humboldt. Col. Lippitt has been ordered there with two companies.
