

ARRIVAL OF INDIAN PRISONERS.—Lieut. Middleton, of Company C, 1st Batt. Mountaineers, passed through town, on Tuesday last, with another batch of Indians, twenty-three in number, en route for the Peninsula opposite Fort Humboldt. By these last captures, Trinity County, as we are informed, has been cleared of all Indians who live in ranches within its limits. Would that we could say as much for Humboldt County. Co. C has labored faithfully and perseveringly towards this end, and success is the reward of their zeal and industry. Without reflecting upon others of the Battalion, we feel it due to the officers and men of Company C, to say they are entitled to the award of "Well done, good and faithful servants." Now that Trinity County is freed of Indians, what will be her course and policy in regard to them hereafter? It rests with her to say whether they shall ever again be permitted to make their abode within her limits, should they escape from or be permitted to leave their present quarters. We think we could speak the mind of Humboldt County, were she so situated, and were the same question propounded to her, and it would be that not a mother's son of them should ever be permitted to return within her limits. We hope our friend Gordon, of the Journal, will give this question a moment's reflection.
