

"Fourteen Indians were killed by white men near Eden Valley...";  
"The hunt for the hostile Indians in northern California still continues."

~~It~~ Fourteen Indians were killed by white men, near Eden Valley, in the Russian river country, Sonoma county, on the 31st of December. The Indians had killed and eaten seven horses belonging to the whites, and committed other depredations, which induced the whites to the above severe retaliation.

It is said that over 100 Indians have been killed by whites within a few months in that section of the State.

~~The~~ The hunt for the hostile Indians in northern California still continues. The Humboldt Times says of a late expedition against them that, on Monday night, 21st December, they captured seventeen ranches, taking in all, 84 prisoners. The ranches were situated on Mad river, being scattered at various distances, from a quarter of a mile to a mile apart, and so well was the attack planned and executed that not a gun was fired nor an Indian escaped. It is Gen. Kibbe's impression that the guns of the Indians are either hid out, or that they are in the hands of other Indians, as only two were to be found in the entire number of ranches taken. Another evidence of it is, that an Indian was surprised and killed near Angelo's ranch, one day last week, and upon his person was found a shot-pouch with a considerable amount of powder and ball and caps, but no gun.
