

MORE INDIAN MASSACRES.—Through the attentions of Mr. E. Swift, of Swift & Co's Express, we learn that a wholesale Indian killing occurred at Round Valley, Mendocino county, on the morning of January 1st. Like their neighbors of Eden Valley, it appears that the Indians of Round Valley have of late been guilty of committing such unlicensed depredations upon the stock belonging to the white settlers, that the whites have determined upon exterminating the Indians. Accordingly, on the morning of the 1st, an attack was made by the settlers, upon a rancharie, and forty Indians killed. Considerable excitement is said to prevail, the whites having sworn to exterminate the Indians, while Col. Johnson, who arrived there from Eden Valley on the 7th, but unaccompanied by troops, had expressed his determination to attend to the Indians himself; and to this end returned immediately to Eden Valley, where the troops are quartered, for men to execute his orders. His intention is to take the Indians to the Reservation, and thus prevent further trouble.

We further learn that a portion of the command first dispatched from Benicia to that section of Mendocino, has been stationed, under command of Lieut. Carling, at Redwood Valley.

Mr. Swift, on his way down, met a detachment of forty men and nineteen wagons, en route from Benicia to Mendocino. Twenty of the forty men will proceed direct to the Mendocino Reservation, under command of Lieut. Dillon. The balance will probably be quartered in the vicinity of Round or Eden valley.
