

Further Service Required.—The Red Bluff Beacon intimates that the Kibbe Rangers lately disbanded there, will be called upon to subdue the Indians of Humboldt county, who are becoming troublesome again. It is not quite a year since the Humboldt campaign, under Capt. Messec, closed. Several hundred Indians were sent to the Mendocino Reservation; now a large proportion of them are again in Humboldt county, and more fearless and annoying in their depredations than ever.—We can't, for a moment, see what benefit Indian reservations are? A campaign against hostile Indians is authorized by the State; the Indians are subdued and sent to the reservation, which they leave at their pleasure and return to their old haunts to be more troublesome than at first. There is good cause for the Humboldt people to again call for protection. Within two months the red devils have burned one victim at the stake, several murders have been detected—some of the victims cut in pieces and thrown to the waves of the ocean, to say nothing of property destroyed and homes pillaged by them. The Humboldt papers ask that a final termination be put to these outrages; a demand which the State is bound to recognize. The bloody catalogue of transactions of the Indians of Humboldt county for two years is fresh in the minds of all, and as it is a subject deeply interesting to the people of this as well as that county, we hope an effectual end will be put to their proceedings.—*Trinity Journal*. We should like to see Gen. Kibbe in this county again, and unless he does come, or some other man under State authority, there is but little prospect of our county being relieved from Indians. They are daily becoming more daring in their outrages, as will be seen by a letter in another column, from Hydesville. They are now killing stock in the very eyes of the owners, and there is but little doubt that this state of things will continue to exist until such time as the State will lend us a helping hand. Will our members in the Legislature call the attention of the Governor to these facts?
