

MOVEMENTS OF THE VOLUNTEERS.—Some time during the latter part of last week Capt. Messic routed a band of about thirty Indians, in the mountains between Red Wood and Hoopa Valley. They fled towards the coast and was trailed by him to the vicinity of Dow's Prairie, where he had them corralled and while making his arrangements to capture them, they made their escape through the connivance and assistance of the lower Mad River Indians. Gen. Kibbe immediately took three of the head Indians of this tribe prisoners, and will hold them as hostages for the good behavior of the balance of these *friendly* renegades. Here, then, is another instance which forcibly reminds us of the necessity of doing what we have long been advocating—removing these coast Indians. We have no suggestions to offer Gen. Kibbe on this subject, for his position the last few months has qualified him to judge correctly of the prospect of a successful termination of the present campaign, or probability of peace in future without removing the Indians which line the entire coast of our county. The Gen. also knows full well the feeling of our people on this subject, and will doubtless act for their general good so far as is in his power.
