

ANOTHER HORRIBLE INDIAN MURDER BROUGHT TO LIGHT.—We learn that Mr. Brandies, a miner on the Salmon, a short distance above its junction with the Klamath, had been missing for several weeks—supposed to have been murdered by the Indians, but nothing certain was known of his fate until the 31st ult. On that day, the Indians in the vicinity notified the whites that they had a prisoner to deliver up, who had killed a white man; and upon accompanying them to the place indicated, he was found to be a young Indian belonging to a ranch on the Klamath, a little below the mouth of the Salmon. He was immediately taken into custody and examined before a justice of the peace, at Orleans Bar, and bound over to the District Court. He was made to assist in a search for the body, and pointed out the place where it was, in the water, with rocks attached. From the appearance of the body and what was admitted by the prisoner, it was evident that the murdered man, while at work, was approached from behind and killed with a single blow from a hatchet, on the back part of the neck.

Mr. B. was a German, about fifty years of age,—an industrious and inoffensive man. It is believed he has a son in Trinity county, and a family in Wisconsin.

Strong hopes are entertained of being able to find out by the confession of the prisoner, the murderers of the three travelers above Orleans Bar, several months since.
