THE BALD MOUNTAIN FIGHT .- Judging from account given by the Humboldt Times of the at tack on the Indians in their log fort, near the old Trinity trail, Dec. 22d, it was a badly managed affair. Surrounded by sixty or seventy armed soldiers, the Indians were nevertheless allowed to make their escape. Lieut. Tom. Middleton was first sent with thirty men, to dislodge the red skins from their position, which it was found -could not be done. Then a messenger was sen to Fort Gaston for more help and a mountain howitzer, and Capt. Ousley, with forty men and the gun went to his assistance. But the ammunition finally gave out, and another messenger was sent to Gaston for more. Then Col. Whip ple, with a squad of men, went to the scene of conflict, but arrived there the bird had flown. The Times is under the impression that the affair was badly managed, but blames no one in par-
