

THE BALD MOUNTAIN FIGHT.—Judging from an account given by the *Humboldt Times* of the attack on the Indians in their log fort, near the old Trinity trail, Dec. 22d, it was a badly managed affair. Surrounded by sixty or seventy armed soldiers, the Indians were nevertheless allowed to make their escape. Lieut. Tom. Middleton was first sent with thirty men, to dislodge the redskins from their position, which it was found could not be done. Then a messenger was sent to Fort Gaston for more help and a mountain howitzer, and Capt. Ousley, with forty men and the gun went to his assistance. But the ammunition finally gave out, and another messenger was sent to Gaston for more. Then Col. Whipple, with a squad of men, went to the scene of conflict, but arrived there the bird had flown. The *Times* is under the impression that the affair was badly managed, but blames no one in particular.
