YREKA NEWS.—We clip the following from the Mountain *Herald* of the 21st. inst.

Captain Juda, commandment at Fort Jones, on receiving information of the late Indian difficulty at or near the cave of the Klamath river, where four white men were killed and five wounded, proceeded with his force, which was but 26 men, to the scene of action. He passed through this place on Tuesday morning last, proceeded to Cottonwood, recruited 30 volunteers and started up the river on Wednesday last, since which time we have not heard from the party. Capt. Goo' all, of this place, is authorised to raise volunteers for this expedition. Capt. J. will reconnoiter, and if he finds reinforcements are necessary, he will dispatch an express to this place, in which case we hope our citizens will render him such aid as will secure the speedy subjugation, if not extermination, of these thieving tribes.

The weather has been extremely cold for the last few days. The thermometer yesterday morning stood three degrees below zero. This is the coldest weather we have ever seen in California.
