

INDIAN TROUBLES IN MENDOCINO. We are sorry to learn that the Indians have again become very troublesome to the settlers of Mendocino county. Mr. White, a resident of Long Valley, informs us that they have become so bad that the settlers have been compelled to organize themselves into a standing army, so to speak, and by taking turns keep their stock and homes under constant guard. For some time previous, to this being done, the Indians had killed from ten to fifteen head of stock nightly. One gentleman alone, Mr. Woodman, had lost 109 head of horses, 74 of which were found dead in a cañon not far from his place, and upon the bodies of which the Indians were having a good feast. On the 19th of December the settlers turned out, and attacking the enemy succeeded in killing 32 and taking two prisoners. The U. S. troops located in that region are represented to be pursuing, during all these troubles a "miserable course of inactivity." The aid of the State has therefore been asked, and will we trust be granted.
