

**RETURN OF A REFUGEE.**—Michael Dacey, one of the miners recently driven from New River by the Indians, arrived here from Salmon river, *via* Trinity Center, last Saturday. He gives a thrilling account of the trip of the refugees across the Salmon divide, and the engagement with the Indians, the day after their arrival on Salmon river. The Indians had stolen most of the arms and ammunition from their cabins on New river before the miners were aware of their presence. The red-devils boldly told them that they were snow-bound and in their power, but strange to say, spared their lives. The first night in the mountains the Indians, who were in pursuit, camped within a few hundred yards of them.— He says five white men and a number of Chinamen were killed before he left. Dumfries' store was sacked, the Indians taking whatever they wanted, including all the powder and lead on hand. They notified the whites that they must leave the river—that they could not hereafter live there. The women and children were all brought in safety to Trinity Center.

We learn that Gen. Wright last week ordered Capt. Baird's company of "Mountaineers," lately recruited in Siskiyou county, to proceed immediately to Salmon river, by way of Trinity Center. Capt. Baird replied that it was impossible for him to do so, as his men were without proper clothing, and had not yet received their arms and accoutrements.
