

~~INDIANS ON BEAR RIVER.~~—The premises of Mr. Joseph Russ on Bear river were entered last week by the Indians and robbed of everything valuable. The property taken we are informed consisted in part of a good rifle and bullet-moulds, eleven pairs of blankets; three hair mattresses and nearly all the clothing belonging to himself and his family. While we regret to note the loss sustained by Mr. Russ at the hands of the red devils, we are also sorry to announce that in this plundering expedition they have been enabled to add to their already ample supply of fire arms. Very many of the guns they now have were obtained in a similar manner, and we cannot too earnestly call the attention of those of our fellow-citizens residing in remote and exposed localities, to the impropriety of leaving fire-arms and ammunition about their premises while absent therefrom.
