

LATE FROM SHASTA PLAINS—INDIAN TROUBLES.—Mr. J. Freaner, the Kit Carson of Upper California, arrived on Saturday from Shasta Plains, in which section of country he has resided for the last two years. Mr. F. left this city in October last, since which time he has been constantly in Shasta and Klamath counties. He states that the Indians in the Upper Country have been exceedingly troublesome, and that early in the winter his party had a number of desperate engagements with them. On his way down, he encountered a number of hostile Indians, but fortunately discovered their intentions in time to avoid any loss of men or stock. The Indians of the Shasta Butte County are more warlike than those of any other section of the State, and they bear the most implacable hatred towards all pale faces. The course which the Indian Commissioners have pursued in the reservation of territory in the Upper Country, as well as the measures adopted for the settlement of Indian difficulties, meets with general disapprobation from the inhabitants, who say that hostilities under the existing state of things, will be indefinitely prolonged.
