

**Indian War Debt.**—The Assembly has passed a bill authorizing Samuel B. Smith, a leading Know-Nothing, and a delegate to the K. N. Presidential Convention, to proceed to Washington with the vouchers of the Indian War debt, and to receive the one million dollars appropriated by Congress for the payment of the same. The bill passed the Assembly by a strict party vote—all the K. N. members, so far as we are aware, voting for it. During the debate on the bill, the Governor sent in a special message, recommending that Gen. Denver, Mr. Bates, State Treasurer, and Mr. Phelon, clerk of the late Board of Examiners, be appointed Commissioners to settle this claim with the Secretary of War, and then to allow the General Government to pay the money into the State Treasury, in accordance with the act of Congress—the last named gentleman only, to receive a reasonable compensation for his services. This act of the Assembly shows on its very face an intention of giving a fat job to a political favorite. The Commissioner will not only receive his \$4,800, the amount fixed by the bill as his compensation, but should the money be paid in New York, as is probable, he will make some two or three per cent. on the whole sum—being the difference in exchange between New York and San Francisco—amounting in all to between \$20,000 and \$30,000. We understand that the recommendation of the Governor meets the approbation of most of the Democratic members, while the K. N.'s denounce it as an impertinent interference of the Executive in a matter belonging exclusively to the Legislature. As the K. N.'s. have but a small majority in the Senate, it is highly probable the bill will be defeated in that body. Should it, however, pass the Senate, the Governor cannot consistently give it his sanction.

**Immigrant Wagon Road.**  
 BUREAU, February 6th, 1856.  
 Editor Democrat: It is with through your paper, to call the attention of the public, and our Representatives, to a matter that I deem of vital importance to the interests of this country.  
 At the last session of the Legislature a bill was passed allowing myself and others to open and establish a toll road from Bureka to the Truckee Meadows. The bill, however, did not receive the sanction of the Governor, as he deemed that such matters came within the province of the Board of Superintendents.  
 Now it is of great importance to this community, and the State at large, to have good roads across the mountains for the benefit of the overland immigration; and the route where the immigrant can pass the summit with the least toll to his team, and get the greatest quantity of water and grass with the least trouble, if the one he will travel. The route by Bureka has all these advantages, as well as being shorter than any at present traveled. I have examined most of the roads over the mountains, and can safely say that a good stage road can be made by this route at one third the cost of making a hard wagon road by any other.  
 There is now a good wagon road to Bureka and for near six miles above, and although the road has not been worked to any extent, during the past season loaded teams have passed over it every day with 800 and 1000 feet of green lumber for the Miners' hitch. The French Ditch company that are at the Lakes will expend a large amount of work on this portion of the road, the coming season, for their own benefit.  
 From the Lakes to where the route crosses the Middle Yukon, a distance of five miles, is the only portion of the route requiring any considerable amount of expenditure to make a good wagon road, and I am confident that ten thousand dollars properly expended will make this road so that teams can pass over it with as much ease as they can with the same load go from Sacramento to Bureka. The distance by this route from your place to the Truckee Meadows will not exceed eighty miles. It is certainly the shortest and best from Nevada to Carson Valley, and if once opened all the travel from Carson Valley to Sacramento would be by this route.  
 I see that some of your citizens think that it would be more for the immediate interest of your place to have the expenditures made (if any is obtained) on the old Truckee road; but I must beg leave to differ with them, for I am well acquainted with both
