

DESERVING. — The troops in the field are indebted to an Indian, with a jaw-breaking name, of the Woolspeck tribe for his services, not only as an Indian guide, but as an adviser. He has planned out the course to be taken in every pursuit of the hostiles, and has materially aided both by advice and personal assistance in chastising the Indians. It is the duty of the officers with whom he has served to give him certificates of such service, and the State or United States should pay him well as an inducement for others to do likewise. His name is E-cobs-ic-wa-gah. He has been a faithful ally of the whites since 1850, the first time he ever saw white men.
