

~~HEARD ON THE INDIANS.~~ Lieut. Frazier  
Co. E, C. M., with a detachment of  
twelve men stationed at Upper Mattole,  
started on a scout about the 1st inst.,  
and the night of the 2d succeeded in  
finding some Indians at a place known  
as White Thorn valley, on the Mattole  
river about twenty-five miles from Upper  
Mattole. At this place he captured thir-  
teen squaws and killed four "bucks"—  
none escaping. The Indians offered no  
resistance, being completely surprised.  
He came upon the Indians again some-  
where in the same vicinity, and met with  
the same success. The result of the ex-  
pedition may be summed up thus: Kill-  
ed, fourteen; captured, twenty-one. Of  
the former thirteen were "bucks" and  
one squaw; of the latter, nineteen squaws  
and two children. The prisoners were  
all brought to Fort Humboldt on the 13th  
inst.

These Indians are supposed to be the  
same that killed McNutt in Spetember  
last, and have been engaged in various  
depredations since.

Lieut. Frazier and his men are de-  
serving of great credit for the energetic  
and successful manner in which they  
have applied themselves in the discharge  
of their duties. We are informed that  
the Lieutenant is an old mountaineer, as  
also the men under his command, and  
where he is stationed has a chance, and  
doubtless will, do good service. Success  
go with him.

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
