

TROOPS FOR THE NORTH.—Gen. Wright has signified his intention to send a steamer with the proper supplies and munitions to Humboldt, which will convey Col. Black and two hundred and fifty troops to take the field against the Indians. He makes no objection to Col. Whipple, considering him as an officer of energy and intelligence, but gives the command to Col. Black, an enterprising and experienced officer, for the reason that he sends so large a force of the 6th infantry. Gen. Wright thinks that these troops, with those in the district, will give a good account of the Indians. The troops in the district consist of six companies of the Third Infantry, one of cavalry, and four of the battalion of Mountaineers, all under command of Lieut. Col. Whipple. Three of the companies are not available on account of their being located in sections of the district with which communication is difficult.—*Union.*
