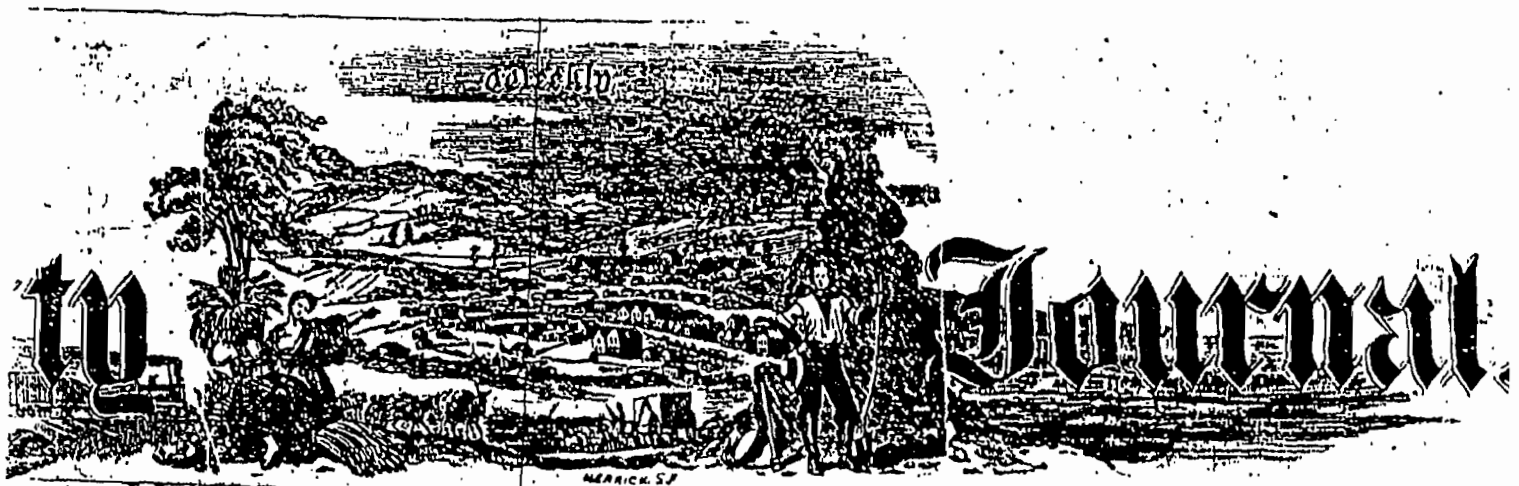


INDIAN OUTRAGES.—The following extract is taken from a letter written by H. C. Allen, living at Hyampom, situated in the extreme southern portion of Trinity county. The letter is addressed to J. P. Jones, Esq., of Weaverville, and was handed us for publication :

"The Indians came in on the 22d ult. and killed an ox belonging to Mr. Clifford, and two hogs belonging in the valley. We suspicioned they were killing stock from the fact of missing the hogs; tried to trail them, but it stormed so that we had to give it up until to-day. Yesterday Mr. Clifford and Mr. Comasky went to look for their cattle, and found that twenty or thirty were missing, and discovered where the Indians had run a number of them off. They returned and gave the alarm, and to-day we followed until we got their course; to-morrow we are going to start after the cattle and catch the Indians, if possible. Evidently quite a number are concerned in it, but I am in doubt whether any of our friendly Indians are of the party. I have feared the Indians for some time, and think there will be more trouble now with them than ever heretofore. You know the trouble and losses they have had in Humboldt, and I am in fear that Trinity county will suffer in the same way. I hope something may be done to protect the citizens of this portion of the county from their depredations."

Since the above was written we learn from Mr. Clifford that on Tuesday the party who went in search of the cattle-stealing Diggers, overtook and surrounded them, and that Hank Young, one of the attacking party, was shot. We could not hear whether Young was dangerously wounded, or whether any Indians were killed.
