

**THE MENDOCINO INDIANS.**—The Mendocino Herald's correspondent says: "The Yreka tribe are those mostly within the valley, and immediately adjoining in the mountains. They number perhaps five or six hundred; whilst the Tlackees, a more warlike and unfriendly class, range within a scope of country some ten or twelve miles round, and number, perhaps, two thousand or more. They have a great dread of the Reservation, and will not remain on it when taken there, and seem even to take pleasure in killing all kinds of stock whenever the opportunity offers. They are particularly fond of mule meat, which they usually kill in preference to the fatted calf. A few days since, the slaughtered carcasses of horses and mules were found scattered in all directions upon their trail and large quantities of such supplies laid up at their rancherias."
