

INDIAN MASSACRE AT HUMBOLDT BAY.—From Humboldt we learn that on Sunday, the 26th ult., a body of Del. river settlers, numbering some forty, crossed to the South shore of the Bay and killed all the Indians to be found—men, women and children—in all about eighty. The reason given for the wholesale slaughter is that the Bay Indians are leagued with those of the mountains, and are continually killing cattle. A writer to the San Francisco *Bulletin* predicts that it will be the cause of another speedy Indian war. An aged Indian is reported to have very gravely informed the citizens of Eureka that as his wife and children had been killed, he intended to proceed with the remnant of his tribe to the mountains, and henceforth wage war against the settlers. Such a condition of things is to be regretted, but however inhuman the wholesale slaughter may be considered by would be philanthropists, there has been enough provocation, and the course pursued seems to have been the only alternative, recent petitions for aid having been totally unheeded.
