

POSTSCRIPT.



BY THIS MORNING'S BOAT.

The steamer Confidence arrived at her landing this morning, at 3 o'clock.

From the San Francisco papers, we copy the following items:

A villanous attempt was made to blow up a house on Rincon Point, on Sunday night. A considerable quantity of powder had been placed under the side, and ignited, but did no other damage than to blacken and char the clapboards, nearly setting them on fire.

Gov. McDougal passed through San Francisco on Monday, on his way to San José.

The Indian Commissioners have concluded a treaty of peace with the Indians on the Tuolumne, the tribes pledging themselves to till the land, and hold a perpetual peace with the whites, upon the conditions that an allotment of 160 acres of land be made to each family, and that they be furnished with horses, cattle, seed, farming implements, a blacksmith, farmer, and other persons to instruct them.

The other tribes refuse to treat, and Maj. Savage has been authorized by the Commissioners, to re-commence hostilities.
