MORE INDIAN OUTRAGES.—Last Monday an express arrived from Hay Fork, stating that the Indians had killed Mr. John Fulwider, an old citizen of Weaverville, at Soldier's Camp, in Kittenshou valley. Mr. Fulwider had been stopping on the claim of Jas. Howe, Esq., of this place, in charge of stock, of which there was some thirty head of horned cattle and about two hundred hogs, all of which the courier says had been killed or driven off. The body of Mr. Fulwider had not been found, but his hat, pierced with a bullet, and covered with blood, was picked up, which is pretty good evidence that he had been murdered. There are a large number of Indians in that section, and on good authority we learn that they are well armed and have plenty of ammunition. A party was to leave Hay Fork on Wednesday to chastise the marauders, and we hope, if the above statements prove true, that they will share the fate of the murderers overtaken by Sheriff Dixon and party in 1852. We insist that there is but one remedy for this evil—total extermination.
