The End of the Indian War. General Kibbe has returned from the wars, and we perceive by the following from the Humboldt Times, of March 26th, that the Indian War may be considered at an end. All that is now required is, that the Legislature will foot the bills:

The usual bustle and confusion attending the disbanding of a volunteer company has been going on in and about Union this week. Gen. Kibbe issued an order for the company to disband at Big Bar, where they were mustered into service. Several of the company, however, who belong in this county, and others who do not wish to return to Trinity, will be disbanded here on the same day that the company will disband at Big Bar.

Gen. Ki be is confident that there will be no further disturbance, and in a card which he publishes in the Northern California, he requests that the citizens will forbear visiting any further punishment upon any Indians they may find, without just cause or provocation. Three hundred Indians have been taken prisoners, and sent to a Reservation, and nearly one hundred have been killed.

Gen. Kibbe intends to use his influence in having them removed to some southern Reservation, when he goes below.

Nothing remains now but for the Legislature to pay the expenses incurred in the expedition out of the State Treasury, and look to the General Government to have it refunded. The company have done all that men could do, and we expect the Legislature will act liberally, and promptly with them.



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
