

MENDOCINO RESERVATION.—Last Wednesday, we saw and conversed with Messrs. Tobin and Henley, who had just arrived in town from the Mendocino Indian Reservation, and who represented affairs to be in a prosperous condition. The Indians number several thousand, and with few exceptions, appear contented and happy; they are fast acquiring a knowledge of husbandry and civilization. Several hundred acres of potatoes, oats, &c., have been planted, and bid fair to yield an abundant crop. The amount of tillage land is ample, and the soil well calculated for agricultural purposes, while the climate for health and comfort, is unsurpassed on this coast, being within a few miles of the sea, yet protected from the high winds by a dense forest of timber.
