

Indian Disturbances in the North.

We are informed that intelligence of recent revolts among the Indians in the counties of Trinity, Klamath, and Shasta has been received by the gentlemen representing those counties in the Legislature. This intelligence, we understand, has been communicated to the Governor by the U. S. Commissioner, Col. McKee. These difficulties, it is said, have occurred since the treaties were concluded with the Indians by the Commissioner during his late Northern campaign.

The letters transmitted to the gentlemen representing the counties named in the Legislature, state that one hundred and forty white men have been killed by Indians in those counties within a very short time past, and that property valued at a quarter of a million dollars has been destroyed or stolen by them during the same period. It is represented that the most daring outrages daily occur, and that unless prompt measures are taken to check them, the Indians will have to be exterminated, or the whites will be obliged to evacuate the country.
