How the States were formed.
Maine was so called as early as 1639, from Maine in France, of which Henrietta Maria, Queen of England, was at that time proprietor.
New Hampshire was the name given to the territory conveyed by the Plymouth Company to Captain John Mason, by patent, November 7, 1639, with reference to the patentee who was Governor of Ports mouth in Hampshire, England.
Vermont was so called by the inhabitants in their declarations of independence, January 15, 1776, from the French *verde green* and *mont*, mountain.
Massachusetts was named after a tribe of Indians in the neighborhood of Boston. The tribe is thought to derive its name from the blue hills of Milson. "I have learned," said Roger Williams, "that Massachusetts was so called from the Blue Hills."
Rhode Island was so called in 1824 in reference to the island of Rhodes, in the Mediterranean.
New York was so called in reference to the Duke of York and Albany, to whom this territory was granted.
Pennsylvania was so called in 1531, after William Penn.
Delaware was so called in 1703, from the Delaware Bay, on which it lies, and which received its name from Lord La Warr who died in this bay.
Maryland was so called in honor of Henry Philip Maria Queen of Charleat in his day.
