

INDIAN OUTRAGES AT HUMBOLDT.—We are informed by a gentleman who arrived from Humboldt Bay last evening on the bark *Ort*, that on the 5th inst. a band of twenty of the Hoopa Indians, attacked a train one mile from Fort Anderson, at Miner's Ranch, on the Redwood Creek. At daybreak they fired into the camp, fortunately not doing any damage. The sentinel at Fort Anderson heard them firing and gave the alarm to Capt. Douglas, who only had an available force of twelve men, as detachments were out on the scout. He divided the remaining force into two divisions, taking command of one himself, and rescued two white men and a negro belonging to the train, who were seeking refuge at the fort. Capt. Douglas, with seven men, ran up the hills and found that the Indians had ransacked the goods, and were dressed out in white shirts, etc. Ascertaining that they were Indians, he attacked them, killing one Indian and putting the rest to flight. On the 10th, Capt. Akey of the cavalry, returned to Fort Humboldt from a scout after the Indians who set fire to Cooper's Mills on Eel River, bringing with him fifteen squaws and children, and nine bucks. He had a slight engagement, and killed two. Official dispatches have been sent to Gen. Wright.
