

Volunteers.

Thirty volunteers, for which Gen. Johnson made requisition and Gov. Downey ordered to be enrolled for the term of three months to act as guides, were mustered into the service of the United States on Wednesday, at Fort Humboldt. They are first rate men for the service they are expected to render;—experienced mountaineers, familiar with the district of country infested by hostile Indians, accustomed to a frontier life, and know well the foe they are to cope with as well as the hardships and dangers incident to the service upon which they have entered.

Although they have not heretofore been subject to military discipline, they are not ignorant that the first duty of a soldier is to render a respectful and prompt obedience to the commands of their officers—this they are prepared to do. We are satisfied that a good report will be given of them during the next three months, and that at the expiration of their term of service each one will be entitled to an honorable discharge.

The campaign against the bands of hostile Indians that have so long preyed upon the lives and property of the people of this county is now assuming a shape which must result in good. Capt. C. S. Lovell, Commanding Fort Humboldt, has the general management of the campaign. All the effective force from Forts Humboldt and Gaston, and Camp Bragg, have already or soon will take the field, which with the thirty volunteers will constitute a rather formidable force. Lieut. Underwood's Command, Fort Gaston, will be in the vicinity of Upper Redwood creek and Upper Mad river. Ten of the volunteers will leave Fort Humboldt to join Capt. Underwood's Command on Monday; the others will join Lieut. Collins, and if it is found necessary ten of them will be sent to Lieut. Dillon. News from the several parties will be eagerly looked for by our readers, which we hope to receive from time to time.
