

MORE INDIAN TROUBLES ON ANTELOPE.—A Mr. Hobby, in going from our town to Ferguson's ranch, says the Red Bluff Beacon of Wednesday, was attacked by Indians, not far from the crossing of Payne's Creek, near where Mr. Allen and his son were murdered by them not long since. Mr. Hobby was on horseback, and owing to a curve in the road, was within sixty yards of the Indians before they saw him. They began to fire arrows at him with all their might, as soon as they discovered him, but he being on a good horse, and so very near to them, was enabled to ride past them before they succeeded in lodging any arrows either in himself or horse. Dr. Inskeep went to the place of attack next morning, and thinks, from appearances, that they have been watching the road some time, from a point of rocks below Cold Spring Valley. In this instance they were watching some men at work on a ranch about 400 rods off.—Our informant did not state how many Indians there were.
