Raines to send out a detachment and establish a post somewhere near the head waters of Yager Creek, which would answer the double purpose of affording protection to travelers between Trinity and the Bel River settlements, and a safe-guard for stock. The soldiers are of no service in the garrison, and as it would not cost Government any more to feed them in the mountains than where they are; we think the commander of this post now has an opportunity of accomplishing some good for our citizens with his command, and if he has any intention of ever placing the forces at this post in a position to render any service to this section of the country, we hope he will embrace the present opportunity.
