THE BAY OF SAN FRANCISCO.

An article showing to what extent the Bay of San Francisco, in front of the city, has filled up during the last few years. The water has greatly decreased in depth, and the depth of water is now an average of about five feet and a half. A tidal-gate extending along the entire front to Orlieb's Point has been gradually accumulated. Up to this time the water has been allowed to drain off the bay, but recently the depth has decreased from 100 feet to 60 feet, and it is now only 40 feet deep.

An Irish woman, apparently about 20 years of age, was seen and requested him to hold her baby for a moment. NEWS LACKS COAL MINES.—Some specimens from the coal mines recently discovered on the Noina Locke Indian Reservation, have been exhibited at Red Bluff, Nevada. It is the most valuable coal in the State, and is of the bituminous class, and of the quality generally designated "brown coal." The partial examination given it, seems to be of a very excellent quality. The specimen examined was from the overlying stratum, and is undoubtedly of an inferior quality to that which will be produced when the bed is fairly opened.

QUANTY LION.—Mr. A. C. Chandler, says the Marysville News, who resides about a mile west of Long Bar, on the Yuba, has, within a few days, discovered a rich quartz lode, on the left of the road, leading from Marysville to Long Bar, ten miles from Marysville. Mr. Chandler has prospectors on the lode for about 200 feet, and found it very extensive and very rich.

They are very fond of gambling, and are very dishonest.

The Chinamen were not injured, but the track was completely ruined.
