

Indian Troubles North—Particulars of a Fight.

TEHAMA, May 4th.

Tom Geirick, from the head of Thomas creek, brings intelligence that a man named Watson was murdered by Indians near Stony creek, while hunting cattle, Tuesday. During the next two days, the Indians killed Darling's Indian sheep header, and broke into a house and stole what arms and ammunition was in it, and committed several other depredations. The settlers then organized a party under D. Lacock of Thomas creek, and Shannon of Round Valley, to follow and chastise the Indians, and engaged a party of Nome Lackee Indians to act as guides, who reported them to be encamped near Jake Henderson's, about six miles west of Nome Lackee Reservation, last night. The party attacked the camp at daylight this morning, killing fourteen Indians, three squaws, and taking four squaws prisoners. Shannon was killed in the engagement, and a man named Ford was dangerously wounded. The Indians retreated into the coast mountains, and our informant states that a party are in pursuit of them. They are said to be about forty Pitt Indians escaped from Nome Cult Reservation and two Mexicans.
