

MORE TROUBLE WITH INDIANS—MAY SHOT.
—For the last five or six weeks the Indians

have been killing cattle in the vicinity of Yager Creek, and knowing that the few settlers there were not able to protect the stock, we have been urging the commander of the Post here to send out troops. On Wednesday evening we received the following note from a gentleman residing at Hydesville, for whose veracity we can vouch:

May 11th, 1859.

FRIEND WILBY: James C. Ellison was wounded in the groin with an arrow by the Indians on Yager Creek yesterday evening. The messenger left too soon after the affair to judge of its character from its effects. The party discovered twenty or thirty Indians packed with beef and gave chase. Ellison being ahead, after killing two or three, was fired at from the brush by as many more, one arrow only taking effect.

It is supposed that the Indians have killed as many as two hundred head of stock within a short time. Quite a large party left Hydesville this morning for the hills, intending to stay some little time if necessary. Will any go out from Eureka?

P. S. Ellison pulled the shaft out and it is supposed the head is still in the wound.

Immediately after receiving the letter, we applied to Maj. Raines to know if any troops could be sent out, before appealing to the citizens for help. He assured us that a detachment would set out immediately.—
Capt. Lovell and Lieutenant Harcastle accompany the expedition.

Most sincerely do we regret the accident which has happened our friend Ellison, and we are satisfied that if the troops had been sent out three weeks ago, as they ought to have been, that one good man would not have been severely, if not dangerously wounded.
