Isaac Blackford as one of the Judges of the Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia. Judge Blackford is a native of New Jersey. He came to Indiana a very young man, in 1812. The country was then a wilderness. Our young adventurer came on foot, with a gun on his shoulder, a law book in his pocket, and a mind well stored with legal learning. He was first made clerk to the territorial council, then a member of the House, and afterwards Speaker of that body. Upon the organization of the State government, he was made Judge of the Court of Appeals, which position he held until 1852. He has since administered the law in various capacities, and is now a member of the Supreme Court of the State of Indiana. He is a man of great talents, and his services to his country are highly valued.
