

ANOTHER MAN KILLED BY INDIANS.—We learn from Henry Allen, who arrived from Hiampom on Thursday, that James Ryan, who resides on Pelletreau's ranch, in that valley, was shot by Indians last Saturday, while working in his garden. His body was not found until the next morning. The Indians had taken his rifle and revolver. He had been shot three times from a thicket near the house, one shot going in under the left shoulder and passing out just above the lung, and another taking effect in the vitals. He was buried by the neighbors on Sunday.

Another citizen has gone to his long home at the hands of our wily, savage enemy. If the people of Trinity had any idea how long this state of things would last they could at least pull up stakes and flee the impending danger.— We have been promised aid for many months past,—have furnished men for the purpose,—but so far it has not come. Our people are tired of petitioning, yet we understand that prominent citizens and tax-payers of Trinity again intend appealing to Col. Black for the long-promised aid. May it not be in vain.
