

### The Indian Excitement

We understand that the meeting of Ranchmen and others held at Corum's Ranch, on Sunday last resulted in a determination to make one more peaceable effort to put an end to the present Indian disturbances in this neighborhood. A petition was hastily drawn up and signed by some thirty-five or forty persons and forwarded to Col. Henly, Indian agent, asking that some decisive measures should be immediately taken to repress the Indian outrages. Letters accompanied the petition stating more fully than that instrument, the particulars of the grievances, and intimating in a manner, not to be misunderstood that, unless the complaint was attended to forthwith by the proper officers, the sufferers would be compelled to take the matter into their own hands and protect their persons and property in a manner that American citizens well know how to do, as a last resort. We understand that Col. Henly is now in the Mountains, above, and will be in this place in a few days, on his return when we trust he will give his personal attention to the grievances complained of, and, either in person, or through the local agent, Mr. Delano, take such steps as will put an effectual stop to any further aggressions, and, if possible, bring to punishment those who have already offended.
