

#### Indian Outbreak on Trinity.

By the arrival of John Warren, Wen-  
ver mail carrier, we learn that a band of  
Indians, about 40 in number, made an  
attack on McCameron's store, at Cedar  
Flat, Trinity county, on Thursday night  
of last week. Mr. McCameron and a  
man named Myers were there alone at  
the time, and the first intimation they  
had of the approach of the Indians was a  
velley of about 30 guns. They immedi-  
ately ran for their lives, and both escap-  
ed. Myers reached Burnt Ranch and  
gave the alarm in time for Mr. Winslett  
to get his family away, the Indians com-  
ing up and burning his house and de-  
stroying everything on the farm next  
morning. They then went to Mr. Brain-  
ard's, near by, and burned and destroyed  
everything on his place; he, too, having  
left with his family.

~~At Cedar Flat the Indians made a good~~  
haul of provisions, carrying off 3,000 lbs.  
of flour and other goods, amounting in  
all to about \$1,500. They pressed six  
animals into service to pack off their  
goods, four mules being the property of  
Alex. Tinsley. Great excitement exists  
along the river, and by this time we sup-  
pose there is not a white man between  
Taylor's Flat and Hoopa Valley.

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
