

THE VOLUNTEER COMPANY.—J. B. Hagans, who was sent by the people of this county to solicit the aid of the Governor in our behalf, in Indian matters, writes back that he had an interview with Governor Downey, and that his Excellency talked favorable to calling out Capt. Wright's Company. He proposes, however, that if the company take the field they do so under an agreement of so much per month, and furnish themselves. His Excellency, however, very much to the disappointment of Col. Hagans, did not do either. We shall know more by the next steamer.
