

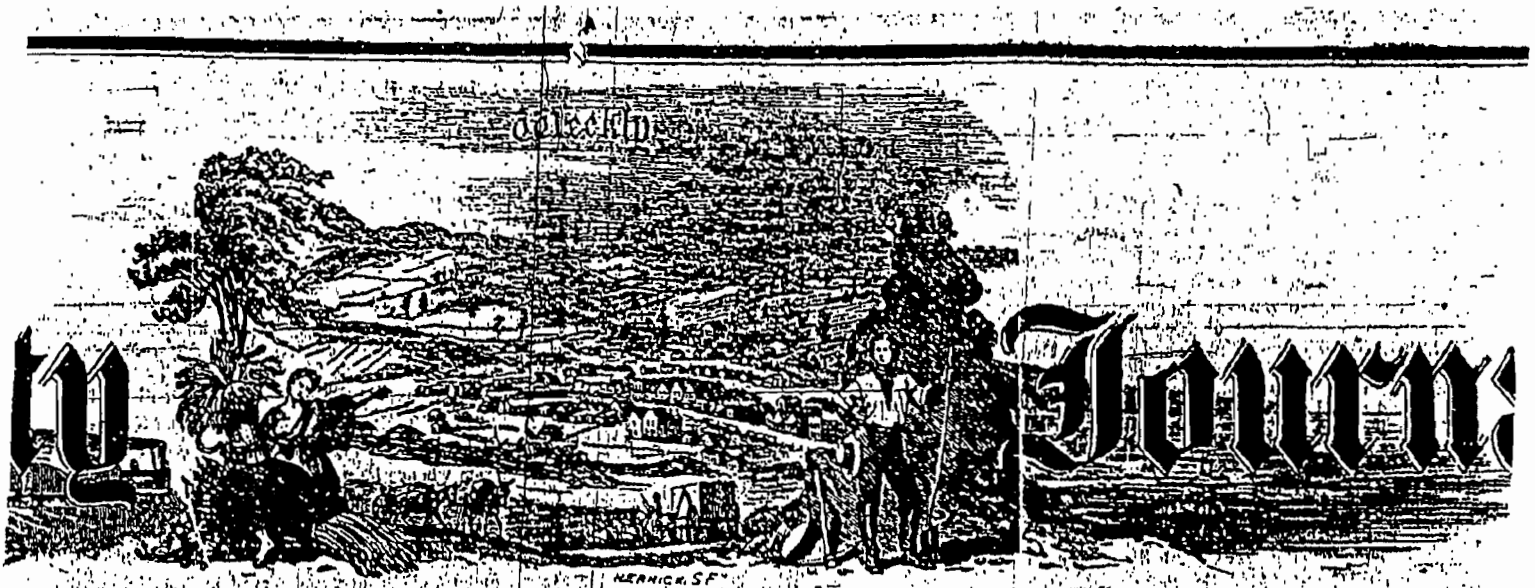

THE BOY HANGING AT RED-BLUFF.—Sheriff Dumb, of Tehama, furnishes the *Sacramento Standard* with the following particulars of release and hanging of the Indian boy who fired Col. Stevenson's residence :

It appears by a telegraph message, published in the *Sacramento Daily Union* of yesterday, that the Indian boy who set fire to Col. Stevenson's house was taken from his place of confinement and hung by the Vigilantes. In justice to the people of this place, allow me to say that it was not so. The law was respected while the boy was held by the proper officer. He was brought up for examination, and discharged on account of his youth, he being considered about nine or ten years old. I am credibly informed that he was afterwards hung.

The *San Francisco Times* relates the following incidents in regard to the trained elephants on exhibition in that city : "One of the attendants carelessly threw the lighted stump of his cigar near the hay, which Albert perceived, and took up with his trunk, removing it some distance and then carefully extinguished the same with his ponderous foot. A Spanish boy fooled Albert also, in handing him some delicacy, whereupon he picked up a small stone which, watching his opportunity, he threw at him with his trunk with such accuracy, although the boy was some twenty feet off, that it struck him on the side of the head and knocked him down.
