

From the Volunteers.

Last week we mentioned that a volunteer company had been organized on the River, to operate against the Indians in the vicinity of Yager Creek and the Bald Hills. The following, concerning their movements, is from our Hydesville correspondent:

HYDESVILLE, May 31st, 1859.

FRIEND WILLY—The volunteer company, alluded to last in the *Times*, was organized on the 24th inst. by electing Abram Lyle Capt.—H. J. Davis, 1st Lieut.—Eli Davis, 2d Lieut. and J. H. Morrison Commissary and Quartermaster. They left this place on Thursday of last week, with provisions for the company (25 men) for six weeks.

They stored their provisions at Mr. White's house, on South Yager, and there divided the company into two divisions, one party going over on to Mad River, and the other on to North Yager.

The detachment that went to Mad River we have no news from; but I learn from A. Monroe, that the detachment that is operating on North Yager, on yesterday morning, succeeded in trailing some Indians to their quarters in the redwoods. Before reaching the ranches, however, they came abruptly upon three Indians who were gathering clover, and not thinking they were so near the ranches, they fired upon them, killing two of them on the spot, and severely wounding the third one. The Indians in the ranches took fright at the firing and fled. The nest was there and warm, but the birds had flown. The boys found plenty of beet bones &c., but the Indians succeeded in carrying off everything that was of any value to them.

The boys are confident of rendering a good account of themselves before they return. The men who arrived to day inform me that in hunting cattle they came in sight of some five or six bands of Indians in the vicinity of "Yan Daseen," and it is supposed that as the cattle are all moved from North Yager and there is nothing for the Indians to prey upon there, that they will carry their depredations farther south, and into neighborhoods heretofore unmolested.

The detachment of U. S. troops, under the command of Capt. Loyal, is still encamped at Indian Gulch, or was there at last accounts, and faithfully searching after the "hidden mysteries of diggerdom."

I have not heard direct from the company, but have made arrangements to hear from their movements once a week if possible.
