

LATE FROM THE SEAT OF WAR.—Mr. Folsom, one of the volunteers under Captain Tracy, has just arrived from Georgetown, having left the troops above that place. They were then in pursuit of the enemy, ~~who were encamped upon the~~ North Fork of the South Fork, about twelve miles above Georgetown. The troops in pursuit number 425 men, and are under the command of Capt. Tracy.

Mr. William Jenkins, one of the volunteers who was shot in the recent conflict with the Indians, was from the State of Ohio, and leaves a wife and one child. Every effort was made to recover his body, but the enemy kept up such a galling fire, that the troops were compelled to retire without recovering it. On returning to the spot after the battle, it was discovered that the remains had been burned by the savages.
