FIRST REGIMENT CALIFORNIA VOLUNTEERS.

The Alta says that this regiment expects to be formally mustered into service in a day or two by Governor Downey. Shortly afterwards they hope to receive notice of their acceptance by the Federal Government, with an order to proceed at once to the East for active duty.
