A Southern Conference Fifty Years Ago.

The veteran, Commodore Charles Stewart, in a letter to George W. Child, of Philadelphia, just published, gives an account of a remarkable conversation he had during the war of 1812, with John C. Calhoun, of South Carolina. At the time of their acceptance by the Federal Government, with an order to proceed at once to New York, Mr. Calhoun was boarding on the East for active duty. Gen. Sumner was in the same house during a session of Congress, and they were in the press of which Mr. Calhoun was a member. The Commodore says: "We soon formed an intimacy, and had frequently long conversations with him, as it is known that their uniforms and other necessities will be furnished by citizens, and matters growing out of its existence. The style of the uniform has not yet been fully determined upon, but with most probability, it will be nearly, if not exactly, similar to that of Col. Ellis' regiment—gray flannel of California manufacture, the pants with a narrow black stripe, and the coat, which is a sort of half blouse, half sack, to have a black collar and black cuffs. The color and style of this uniform is pretty and appropriate, and veritable, but many of the men complain that the material is not heavy enough. The boys are in high spirits at their anticipated early departure for the scene of war. As a whole, they are composed of soldier like material, and will, no doubt, should a chance offer, prove themselves worthy of the Golden State.
