

INDIAN MATTERS.—We have received a letter from H. C. Allen, dated Hiampom, June 6th. Mr. Allen had just returned from Fort Gaston whither he had been to present the petition of citizens of Trinity, asking that a detachment of soldiers be sent to Trinity river for the better protection of settlers, and which, as our people are already aware, was successful. His letter tells us that in the lower part of the Humboldt district the Indians have already given themselves up, while the Redwoods and Grouse creek Indians are being hunted with vigor. The lower Trinity and New river Indians are all at Fort Gaston, and there is fair prospect of an early termination of Indian troubles in Humboldt, Trinity and Klamath.
