

## ARRIVAL OF THE "SONORA."

### LATEST ATLANTIC NEWS.

By the arrival of the steamer *Columbia* yesterday, we have files of papers from New York, to May 20th, and San Francisco to June 15th.

The following condensed paragraphs are from the Washington correspondent of the *Alta*:

#### The British Outrages.

The alleged outrages by British cruisers against American merchant vessels, in the Gulf of Mexico, is now calling forth loud expressions of indignation and angry menace among our public men at this point. Lord Napier assures the President that the British officers have exceeded their instructions, and that their conduct will not be approved by his government. Dispatches of a very definite character are being prepared at the State Department for Mr. Dallas, at London, and the President will await the result with a good deal of anxiety.

#### Other Outrages.

The outrages perpetrated upon our citizens by Mexico, New Granada and Nicaragua, has at last received the serious attention of the American Senate. — Mr. Gwin will, at an early day, move to invest the President with the same power towards these States which was given him in reference to Paraguay and South America—that is, power to accompany his demands for redress with the necessary ships of war to enforce his demands. Negotiations with these powers amount to nothing but a mockery. If the responsibility be thrown upon the President, with full power to act, it is believed that "indemnity for the past and security for the future" will be obtained.

#### Mormon Difficulties.

The Mormon difficulty is considered over, as dispatches report that the Mormons have laid down their arms. The Government is disposed to believe the report, and if true, the President will not call out the new volunteers.

The American family of States is increasing as rapidly as the royal household of the British Queen. Minnesota and Kansas are already in the family, and Oregon has been admitted, so far as the Senate is concerned. There is no doubt of the concurrence of the House.

**Indian War Debt.**

The Indian war debt of Oregon and Washington will not be provided for at this session. The amount is so large (upwards of six millions of dollars) that the Military Committee have asked a continuance of time.

**Legislation for California.**

Several important California bills have become laws. An act to punish frauds in forging papers to be used in cases of appeal from the Board of California Land Commissions; one for collecting and preserving in the Surveyor General's office archives, seals, &c. belonging to the old government; also one extending the powers of the U. S. Marshal into both districts.

**Tehuantepec Mail Route.**

The Tehuantepec Company have succeeded in procuring a contract for mail service to commence in October. The result will be to break up the Pacific Mail Company, or force them to reduce their rates at least one half. The mail is to be carried from New Orleans to San Francisco twice a month, and in fourteen days.

**New Appointments.**

The President has appointed D. E. Buel, of El Dorado, Indian Agent, *vice* Stevenson, resigned. Peter Freer will receive the appointment of Postmaster at Oroville, Butte county. The Secretary of the Interior has removed Wm. Gift from the Land Office at San Francisco upon charges preferred against him by numerous citizens of California.

Mr. Nugent, of the *Herald*, is here, and will receive an appointment, as he stands high at the White House. I learn that he would have succeeded Mr. Henly as Indian Superintendent had he arrived here a few days earlier.
