

INDIAN OUTRAGES.—The Humboldt *Times* says on the evening of June 7th, some seventy-five Indians attacked and fired into Daby's ferry-house, on Mad river. A Mrs. Danekin was killed and a Frenchman named Peter Niget was either killed or taken prisoner. The other persons, men, women, and children escaped with some wounds. The Indians attacked on the following evening another house on Mad river, and also fired upon a pack-train. A public meeting was held in Eureka, June 9th, at which it was resolved to send W. Van Dyke to lay the subject before General Wright; and it was also resolved:

“That the presence of white men in the community who, forgetful of all self-respect, place themselves on a level with Indians by cohabiting with squaws and encouraging the presence of Indians about their premises, is a fruitful source of trouble, and should be no longer tolerated.

That it is the duty of all good citizens to discourage by all lawful means, the further apprenticing of Indians of any age, or of either sex.”
