

MOVEMENT OF TROOPS.—There are at present in this military district three companies of the 3d Regiment Inf. C. V., Col. Conner, viz: Co. A Fort Baker, one Company at Fort Gaston and one at Camp Bragg. These troops are soon to be relieved by an equal number of companies of the 2d Inf. C. V., now in Washington Territory, and will rejoin their own regiment under marching orders for the Plains. The company at Fort Gaston, Capt. Johns, and the company at Camp Bragg, Capt. Moore, have not been engaged in active service in the field—consequently we have no means of judging of their efficiency. Company A, Capt. Thos. E. Ketchum, has been constantly in active service for several months past, and has endeavored to accomplish something in prosecuting the war against the Indians. It gives us pleasure to state that their efforts have been successful. Capt. Ketchum and 1st Lieut. Staples have been out with detachments as much of the time as circumstances would permit. They have killed forty Indian warriors, and taken 272 prisoners—about one-sixth of the number bucks, the balance squaws and children. The removal of this company at this time is to be regretted, as they have a familiarity with the country and the haunts and habits of the savages which it will take months for other troops to acquire.
