

**Indian Raid Near Trinidad.**

On Saturday morning last, as the men at the mill near Trinidad were preparing to go about their work they were fired at from behind some rock, by a party of Indians. One man, named Davis, received a ball through his clothes, grazing the skin of his breast. The men—four in number—fled, and were lucky enough to make good their escape. The Indians

robbed the house of blankets, provisions, \$60 in money, one rifle, etc., and then burned it. They did not burn the mill, nor killed but one ox. They then left and went down to Lieut. Hale's place, at the mouth of Little River. Mr. Thos. Harris, who has the place rented, was absent from home, no one being at the house but an Indian boy. They came upon the boy close to the house, and fired

several shots at him, one taking effect in his arm. He succeeded in making his escape. Here the Indians got a large amount of plunder, together with four rifles, after which they burned the house.

The people of Trinidad collected and made preparations to protect themselves, expecting an attack on Saturday night; but the Indians, having all the plunder they could carry, made their way into the mountains.
